Foreword

Good inter faith relations and practical cooperation between different faith communities are vital to the wellbeing of our society. Inter Faith Week shines a light on the rich possibilities of mutual engagement and offers a chance for encounter, learning and practical engagement.

In our diverse society it is of great importance that people of different backgrounds have the chance to learn about what each other hold dear, and what shapes their identity – including, of course, deeply held beliefs. It is vital, too, that – while recognising our differences of practice and belief and celebrating the positive dimensions of diversity – we continue to find ways, as a society, to address genuine differences and to discern the areas of commonality that are the basis of a strong, shared, society characterised by respect, justice and compassion.

21–27 November saw the second national Inter Faith Week take place across England. Over 400 events and projects took place which drew, between them, many thousands of people into discussion, debate, and social action – as well as varied activities from sport to music, dance and art.

Local and national faith and inter faith bodies celebrated the Week and helped raise the profile of work to promote understanding and cooperation between faiths — and also between faiths and wider society. The Week provided, too, an opportunity for faith communities to welcome members of the public to see their places of worship and to learn more about the contribution which they make to society. An increasing number of other bodies such as local authorities, emergency services and many educational institutions also marked the Week.

This short review of the Week can, of course, only capture some of the highlights and themes of the Week's activity. A list of events known to have taken place in the course of the Week is available on the Inter Faith Week website: www.interfaithweek.org.uk.

The 2011 Week will take place from 20–26 November in England (and also in Wales and Northern Ireland). We hope that this short overview of the 2010 Week will inspire you to take part – again or for the first time.

Inter Faith Week 2010

Inter Faith Week took place for the first time in England and Wales in November 2009. In its first year it was led in partnership by the Inter Faith Network for the UK and the Department for Communities and Local Government.

The 2010 Week was led by the Inter Faith Network for the UK in consultation with the Department for Communities and Local Government and also in consultation with the Local Government Association; the Department for Education; the Equality and Human Rights Commission; and the Community Development Foundation.

This report shows some of the ways it was marked. The Week was open to anyone who wished to take part and this overview reflects this variety. Inclusion in the report does not imply endorsement of events or their organising bodies by the Inter Faith Network or by Government.

Inter Faith Week in Wales was led by the Interfaith Council for Wales (IFCW) in consultation with the Welsh Assembly Government. 

Many different types of event took place across England for Inter Faith Week 2010. There were civic celebrations, dialogues and discussions, arts and other cultural events and educational events both in education institutions and in the community.


Venues for Inter Faith Week ranged from churches, gurdwaras, mandirs, mosques, synagogues, and viharas to town halls and civic centres, schools, universities, prisons, hospitals, workplaces and outside spaces such as parks and sports facilities.

The number of events rose significantly in 2010 compared to the previous year and growing numbers of people took part.

Events during Inter Faith Week 2010 appear to have been more concentrated around the middle of the Week than in 2009, with far fewer daytime events taking place on the Saturday (see the chart below). One reason for this might be that events held on the Jewish Sabbath would not be possible for many Jewish participants. This move toward fewer events on Saturday in 2010 may reflect some of the positive ways in which Inter Faith Week has enabled people to show greater sensitivity to the needs of others in their local communities.



Local organisers' report on Inter Faith Week 2010 in Worcester The Week was, again, held in late autumn, when most educational institutions are in session and there are relatively few exams and final coursework deadlines. This was to enable maximum participation by faith communities, school pupils and students in Higher Education and Further Education institutions.

Mitzvah Day — a day of charitable work and social action led by the UK Jewish community, and encouraging the participation of all, regardless of affiliation, wealth, age, gender or nationality — once again took place on the first day of the Week (21 November), and was joined this year by Sewa Day, a day with similar aims. It was a felicitous overlap, with a number of joint events being held at local level; both Mitzvah Day and Sewa Day projects actively encouraged the participation of all members of the local community, irrespective of religious affiliation.

Local and regional launches and celebrations

Local launches and celebrations marking the Week took place in many towns and cities and also rural areas. A significant number were partnership events involving local inter faith groups, local communities and local authorities, often also involving other organisations such as police and fire services; healthcare bodies; local charities and other community organisations; local businesses; and schools, colleges and universities.

Special regional events for the Week took place in the East, the North East, South West, West Midlands and Yorkshire and Humber*. A number of these were organised in partnership with local groups and other organisations and aimed to highlight — in one case through awards — the work of local activists. Government

The Department for Communities and Local Government held a special Inter Faith Week reception at Admiralty House on behalf of Government, celebrating the work of local inter faith activists. Eric Pickles, Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government, and Andrew Stunell OBE, Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government and Minister for Community Cohesion, spoke about the importance of inter faith work and the contribution of faith communities to society.

Local activists from Bradford District Faiths Forum, Northampton Hope Centre and Tower Hamlets Inter Faith Forum, as well as young members of Liverpool Community Spirit Youth Council, were invited to speak about the important work they undertake in their local communities.

The Inter Faith Network assisted DCLG on the event and its Co-Chairs, Bishop Alastair Redfern and Dr Manazir Ahsan, spoke about the importance of local inter faith engagement and also the significant role of national faith communities and national and regional inter

faith organisations, highlighting their work in supporting and advocating for the valuable work of local faith and inter faith organisations.

Music was provided by young Sikh duo Jasdeep Singh Degun (sitar) and Tejbir Singh (tabla) and Yalla, a 5-piece Jewish and Muslim band.

Displays about inter faith work and work on faith and social action were created by IFN and the Faith-based Regeneration Network (FbRN). The Community Development Foundation distributed copies of its publication Faith matters: Case studies from the Faiths in Action Fund.

FbRN distributed copies of its faith and social action guide, *Practical Spirit* (see p12).

Faith and social action

All religions have a rich history of engagement in social action and this was reflected during Inter Faith Week 2010.

"This week I was glad to recognise the contribution of faith groups to our society with 'Inter Faith Week'. You won't find too many churches, temples, mosques or synagogues in this country only interested in what goes on within their own walls. Today and every day, without thanks or applause, you'll get volunteers from every faith group serving their community in every conceivable way: running youth clubs; offering help to the homeless; providing meals to the vulnerable – or simply listening to the lonely. In many ways these communities exemplify the Big Society principles of collective responsibility, neighbourliness and practical skills to get things done.

The experience that faith groups have, the reach into communities that public services may struggle to get to, is invaluable. Religious festivals from Eid to Christmas to Hannukah inspire believers to give to others and think about the less fortunate. Our message in Inter Faith Week was that if faith groups do a tremendous amount individually; collectively they can do even more."

The wellbeing of the local community – how we treat one another, how we respond to issues such as crime and poverty and the quality of life we enjoy day by day – is a subject close to the heart of all faith traditions. During the Week there were many events focusing on social issues. Some involved hands-on social action projects in the local community, such as tree-planting and litter-picking. Others brought members of different faith-based community projects together to explore avenues of collaboration or to discuss responses to social issues such as the needs of asylum seekers and refugees; health; gender; the economic climate; and the environment. Other events involved awareness-raising and fundraising elements which focused on global development issues.



Dialogue, discussion, debate

Working together on social issues is important but talking, listening and discussion is, too, a vital part of growing together as one society — a society where the different backgrounds of people are respected, their distinctive beliefs appreciated and, at the same time, we seek the values and perspectives held in common that can underpin a thriving and peaceful shared society.

In the course of the Week, many events were held where people came together to talk, listen and debate. A large number of dialogues took place around the country. Some were between people of two different faiths (such as Christian-Muslim dialogue).

Others involved people of several faiths. A number of events had a particular focus and methodology to help the learning process such as shared study of sacred texts.

Many topics were addressed: prayer; faith and belief; religious practice; approaches to issues such as the environment, the economy, the Big Society (and what this might mean in particular local contexts), and poverty; human rights; crime; healthcare; the role of women; and ageing and spirituality. Some dialogues tackled sensitive issues, such as how to respond to past and present conflicts and oppression or how to work to counter extremist politics.

Education, sharing and learning

Inter Faith Week 2010 saw a high number of events that helped people to learn about one another, with many local inter faith groups arranging events which highlighted the important role of inter faith work in promoting better community relations and the role that faith groups play in their local communities.

As well as events taking place in educational establishments, there were many that were aimed at promoting learning and mutual understanding within the local community, such as exhibitions with stalls prepared and minded by members of local faith communities; faith trails and peace walks and open-door days where places of worship open their venues to the public; events centred around shared meals; and events where members of other faiths were invited to attend and observe religious worship, festivities or business proceedings.

Following the enthusiasm for Inter Faith Week shown by schools in 2009, the IFN office undertook to contact as many schools as possible with news about the Week, and to highlight the resources for schools available on the Inter Faith Week website. IFN again

Although York does not have the wealth [of diversity] that is present in Leeds or Sheffield, we were able to visit different denomination places of worship and learn a little about each, and about the communities which use them. worked with the Religious Education Council of England and Wales and the National Association of Standing Advisory Councils on Religious Education, as well as the Association of Religious Education Inspectors, Advisers and Consultants and several other organisations, raising awareness of the Week, and including information about the Week in e-bulletins to the members of these organisations. Work was also undertaken to contact independent schools, which had a relatively low involvement in 2009, with the assistance of the Independent Schools Council Information and Advice Service (ISCias), the School Chaplains' Association (SCA) and the Independent Schools Religious Studies Association (ISRSA). The Department for Education circulated information about the Week to their Faith Schools Advisory Group.

Many schools and SACREs took part in the Week, through classroom learning, special events and joining in local interfaith activities such as 'faith trails' and conferences.

Higher and Further Education institutions saw many Inter Faith Week events aimed at learning about the traditions and beliefs of different faith communities. Events on campus were run by students' unions; inter faith societies; two or more faith-based societies working together; chaplaincy teams; staff in theology / religious studies departments; national inter faith organisations; local inter faith groups; and local faith community groups. In many cases, events were organised by two or more of these types of group working together in partnership.

The Inter Faith Youth Trust supported a number of events involving young people.

All religious traditions have long established patterns of engagement with the creative arts, and many events during Inter Faith Week 2010 focused on the artistic and cultural element of shared expression. There were art exhibitions; dance and musical events; shared

meals; storytelling; and poetry recitals. Some events focused on sport as a way of bringing people together.

These events demonstrate the potential of artistic and cultural expression to bring diverse groups of people together, as well as highlighting the cultural richness of England.

The visual arts have been an increasingly important part of Inter Faith Week. There were numerous exhibitions, including a weeklong arts festival and a national inter faith photography competition.



2011 Week materials will be made available on the website and if you have queries or

would like to discuss your event, you can also contact us through a web-form. There are dedicated materials for schools and FE colleges, universities and local authorities as well as tips for getting media coverage.

There is no single Week 'theme' for 2011; however we already know that, with the 2012 Olympics on the horizon, quite a number of groups are thinking about a 'faith and sport' theme. With 'Big Society' a key theme of the Government's agenda, there are also likely to be events looking at faith and volunteering and faith and social action.

Mitzvah Day (www.mitzvahday.org.uk), with its focus on shared social action, will again fall on the first day of the Week and many joint events are anticipated.

Ideas for the Week

- Local faith communities hold an Inter Faith Week discussion on faith and service to the community
- Local faith leaders make a statement affirming their commitment to inter faith work (see the statement on p. 27 for inspiration)
- A church and a gurdwara arrange exchange visits for their congregations
- A Hindu temple hosts an inter faith dialogue event, inviting members of other local communities
- A local inter faith organisation and local faith groups arrange a 'faith trail' visiting places of worship in their city
- Two local faith schools of different faiths hold an inter faith sports event
- Faith groups join with a charity or community group in their area to arrange an Inter Faith Week event for service users and the public
- A vihara or church arranges a special open day event
- A school works with its local SACRE and local inter faith group to host an 'inter faith day' with opportunities to talk with local members of different faiths about why good inter faith relations are important
- A national faith community representative body creates a web resource about the basis within their tradition for involvement by its members in inter faith activity
- A student union works with all the student religious groups in its university to put on a forum on 'What our faiths say about faith and social action'
- With the Olympics in sight, a local faiths forum holds an evening discussion on faith and sport
- A mosque hosts a Muslim-Christian dialogue event
- A local inter faith group holds a joint event with a local Humanist group on "What do I believe and why?"


- A multi faith chaplaincy in a college of Further Education works with students and staff to put on a special Inter Faith Week photography exhibition
- A 'dine at mine' event takes place, with people of different faiths coming together for a meal
- Women of different faiths meet to discuss the role of women in promoting good inter faith relations
- The local paper and radio station host daily slots during the Week for presenters of different faiths to talk about their faith and also what their faith teaches them about getting on well with people of other faiths
- A branch of the Council of Christians and Jews hosts a special Inter Faith Week event
- A local inter faith group and nearby library hold a 'living library' event where people can 'take out' people of different religions and beliefs for half an hour to learn from these 'living books'

"We believe that good inter faith relations are a vital part of a harmonious, just and respectful society.

We pledge today, to deepen our work to increase understanding about and between our faiths and to strengthen our cooperation on social issues.

We renew our commitment to developing effective and long term ways of dialogue and mutual learning. We shall continue to seek to understand the patterns of engagement of our faith communities — through history and today; to affirm the positive aspects of these patterns; and to heal wounds of misunderstanding where these are found.

While our great religious traditions are distinct in belief and practice, there is much that unites us. We will draw on fundamental values held in common and on the wisdom of our respective faith traditions to continue to work – as individual communities and together – for the wellbeing of our society, our wider global community and the planet that is our home.

Alongside all of good will, we will work to tackle with renewed determination the challenges of poverty, ignorance, injustice, crime and violence, and social fragmentation and to help shape a society where all feel at home; all are valued and justly treated; and all have a chance to thrive."

Planning your 2011 event

Some planning tips:

- Send IFN details of your event via the Inter Faith Week website
- Make use of social networking to help raise the profile of your event
- Invite journalists to cover your event
- Download planning resources from the Inter Faith Week website
- Arrange for someone to take good photographs of your event
- Think about how you may evaluate the impact of your event

IFN plans to make further use of web technologies to streamline the process for the registration of events on the Inter Faith Week website and to make use of social media websites.

To increase further the success and ensure the sustainability of the Week – and to continue to attract funding, media attention, volunteer time and public involvement – ways to quantify and measure its impact are being developed. A short evaluation toolkit will be available on the Inter Faith Week website in advance of the Week, along with a survey form to aid the IFN office in evaluating the Week in England nationally.

Updates to the Inter Faith Week website will take place throughout 2011, particularly in the two months leaving up to the Week – be sure to check it out regularly for new information and resources.
