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Inter Faith Week

Inter Faith Week is a programme of the Inter Faith Network for the UK.

The Inter Faith Network for the UK (IFN) was founded in 1987 to "advance public knowledge and mutual understanding of the teachings, traditions and practices of the different faith communities in Britain, including an awareness both of their distinctive features and their common ground and to promote good relations between persons of different faiths."

IFN's role is unique: linking national faith community representative bodies, local, regional and national inter faith bodies and academic and educational bodies with a focus on inter faith or multi-faith issues and working with them to deepen inter faith understanding and cooperation as part of working for the common good.

IFN carries out its work through raising awareness within wider society of the importance of inter faith issues, creating opportunities for linking and sharing of good practice, and providing advice and information to help the development of new inter faith initiatives and the strengthening of existing ones. Inter Faith Week is one of IFN's major programmes.

IFN works for the public benefit and its wide ranging activity touches the lives of many thousands of people directly and through the organisations and initiatives with which it engages. Working with its member bodies is an important part of this. Each of those makes its own contribution to inter faith understanding and cooperation in the UK.

About Inter Faith Week

Inter Faith Week takes place every November, beginning on Remembrance Sunday and running for 8 days. Its aims are to:

- Strengthen good inter faith relations at all levels
- Increase awareness of the different and distinct faith communities in the UK, in particular celebrating and building on the contribution which their members make to their neighbourhoods and to wider society
- Increase understanding between people of religious and non-religious beliefs

Inter Faith Week was initiated in 2009 by the Inter Faith Network for the UK (IFN), in partnership for the first year with the then Department for Communities and Local Government. It is marked in England, Northern Ireland and Wales. The Week drew inspiration from the pioneering Scottish Interfaith Week, led by Interfaith Scotland, which has run since 2004 and with which it works in close relationship².

The Week is supported and led by IFN as part of its overall work to support the development and deepening of cooperation and good relations between people of different faiths in the UK, working on the Week with the Northern Ireland Inter Faith Forum and the Inter-faith Council for Wales.

Inter Faith Week 2017 took place from 12–19 November. It was the ninth Week in England and Wales³, and more activities took place than ever before. The Week was a time of celebration, enquiry and learning. It was also an opportunity for people of different faiths to come together to make a positive difference in their communities. This was especially pertinent in a year that witnessed many painful moments, and where hate crime and terrorism were yet again in the news – Inter Faith Week showed how people can come together to resist the wedges of division.

The Week is part of a year-round pattern of activity. 77% of survey respondents said that they were planning a follow-up activity after the Week.

Inter Faith Week 2017 - the biggest Week yet!

Inter Faith Week 2017 was the largest Week to date, both in terms of activities held and people reached. 702 activities are known to have taken place across England, Northern Ireland and Wales⁴.

Many thousands of people took part in these activities, in dozens of towns and cities and in rural areas.



A map showing the location of activities that took place to mark Inter Faith Week 2017 in England, Northern Ireland and Wales. Scottish Interfaith Week events are also marked.


Who took part?

The 702 activities that took place to mark the Week in England, Wales and Northern Ireland involved over 750 organisations of many kinds. The chart below shows a breakdown of organisations by type.⁵ In addition to those organisations that directly contributed to events, others supported the Week by encouraging participation. This includes media organisations, local and national faith-based bodies,

businesses and not-for-profit organisations; sports bodies and SACREs, among others. 53% of survey respondents worked with new partners for the first time during the Week.

The Near Neighbours Programme of the Church Urban Fund and the Inter Faith Youth Trust supported with grants a number of events during the Week.

Inter Faith Week 2017: Organisations by type





Types of activity

An enormous range of activities was held to mark Inter Faith Week. The chart below shows activities according to number and type held in England, Wales and Northern Ireland.⁶

The category 'other' includes 60 activities such as media broadcasts, film screenings, displays or the publication of online resources. 70% of survey respondents did something they had not done before during the Week.

Spreading the word

The Inter Faith Network for the UK publicised the Week throughout the preceding months, using a dedicated website www.interfaithweek.org, targeted mailings, a widely distributed flyer, badges, Twitter and Facebook and, for the first time, Instagram.

The Inter Faith Week branding was available for download on the Inter Faith Week website to assist with publicity, and this was widely used.

Social media

Inter Faith Week 2017 was the biggest Week to date on social media, with Twitter, Facebook and Instagram being widely used to spread the message of the Week, as well as news and information about events and activities.

Inter Faith Week was active on Twitter, Facebook and Instagram in the build up to the Week and throughout the Week itself. Inter Faith week is at 'IFWeek' on all three platforms.

On Twitter, use of the hashtags #InterFaithWeek and #IFWeek was encouraged, with the former being most widely used. In total, tweets about the Week had a potential reach of 13.4 million Twitter users, the most to date, registering around 40.4 million potential impressions. On Facebook, people were encouraged to 'like' the Inter Faith Week page.

Prominent figures and organisations tweeted and posted about the Week, including the Prime Minister, Lord Bourne of Aberystwyth, the Mayor of London, the Chief Rabbi, a number of government departments, and many IFN member bodies.

Inter Faith Week also worked with the National Union of Students to run a special social media campaign, #IFWCoffeeconvos, encouraging informal conversations about faith and belief during the Week.

Traditional media

Inter Faith Week has a strongly local focus and in 2017 the Week received excellent coverage in numerous local newspapers and on local radio. Local news coverage significantly increases the impact of activities and strengthens programmes of work conducted for the Week. It also prompts some people to consider getting involved in inter faith activity for the first time, and encourages participation in future years.

Multi faith Remembrance and peace events

The Inter Faith Network Board of Trustees decided that Inter Faith Week would begin on Remembrance Sunday and it has done so since 2016. The Week is arranged to begin on that day to allow people of different faiths and beliefs to mark this together, remembering the service of soldiers and civilians of many faiths.

Many Inter Faith Week Remembrance events were held, including some at war memorials and places of worship. Multi faith events were held by many different organisations. Some events had a specific focus, such as looking at themes of war and peace within religions.

Social action and social issues

The Week was marked in a number of areas through multi-faith social action projects helping local communities through practical activities such as collecting and distributing clothing and toiletries for refugees; meals for the homeless; and improving local parks and other social amenities.

Many were joint projects to mark both Inter Faith Week and Mitzvah Day, which took place on the last day of the Week. Inter Faith Week works closely with Mitzvah Day which, led by the Jewish community, is one of three major days of faith-linked social action in the year, along with Sewa Day and Sadaqa Day.

The Week also saw a wide range of discussions and workshops looking from a religion and belief perspective at such issues such as hate crime, religious discrimination, segregation, health, environmentalism, and refugees and migration.

Standing together

During 2017 there were terrorist attacks at the Manchester Arena and in London at Westminster Bridge, London Bridge, Finsbury Park and Parsons Green.

Several Inter Faith Week events had strong 'standing together' dimensions or tackled issues around hate crime, which had spiked in some areas in the wake of attacks.

There was discussion about hate crime and how to report it, the role that faith communities have to play in tackling hate crime and also prejudice, and how young people can come together to stand up against these. In some areas, such as Cheshire, the police led on such events and discussions.

Earlier in the year IFN had published 'Looking After One Another: The Safety and Security of our Faith Communities' in partnership with the Crown Prosecution Service, the then Department of Communities and Local Government, the Home Office, the National Fire Chiefs' Council and the National Police Chiefs' Council. Copies of this were made available for Inter Faith Week events. Celebrating

Inter Faith Week provides an excellent opportunity for communities to celebrate their diversity and the contributions made by faith groups and inter faith organisations to their communities. Events were organised by faith groups, inter faith bodies, local authorities and many others.

Celebrations took place at schools, colleges and universities and at places of worship and museums. Activities focused on bringing people together to learn about different faiths and beliefs, and to recognise the positive contributions that they make to communities.

Sport events

Inter Faith Week saw a number of sporting events being held, encouraging the building of mutual respect and understanding through physical activity. Multi-faith sporting activities are an excellent way to bring together people from different backgrounds, and can contribute to fostering positive relations between people of different faiths and beliefs within communities.

Events included inter faith football matches, such as those organised by Surrey FA Youth Forum, Carshalton Athletic FC, Manchester Jewish Soccer League, the Abu Hanifah Foundation and others. Other events included a cycle ride around places of worship, organised by Westminster City Council along with the Westminster Faith Exchange and Cycle Confident, a Kabaddi tournament and a yoga session.


Using the Power of Sport to Build Good Inter Faith Relations

On 14 November the Inter Faith Network for the UK, in partnership with Sporting Equals, held a special Inter Faith Week symposium entitled 'Using the Power of Sport to Build Good Inter Faith Relations'.

The symposium provided an excellent opportunity for practitioners from the world of sport and from inter faith initiatives to explore how sport can help people of different backgrounds to meet one another, come to understand each other better, develop skills for cooperation and build stronger inter faith relations.

The event was held at Leicester Tigers' stadium and participants came from national sports organisations, regional sports clubs, public sector organisations, and faith and interfaith bodies. Presenters at the symposium in plenary and in workshops were: Arsenal FC in the Community; Association of Muslim Schools Inter Faith Games Programme; Burnley Football Club; Building Bridges in Burnley; Essex County Cricket Club; Gwent Police Multi Faith Panel; the Inter Faith Network for the UK; Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government; Near Neighbours programme of the Church Urban Fund; Premiership Rugby; Sporting Equals; the English Federation of Disability Sport; University of Leicester Unit for Diversity, Inclusion and Community Engagement; Windsor and Maidenhead Community Forum; and the Women in Sport Project, Manchester.

Sharing and learning

Inter Faith Week is a great way to boost religious literacy; a time for people to learn about the faith and beliefs that their neighbours hold dear and that help shape their lives.

In 2017 numerous activities were held where people shared their own beliefs alongside learning about the beliefs of others. This happened in the context of visits to places of worship, multi-faith discussion panels, dialogues and multi-faith meals as well as university 'speed faithing' encounters.

Other organisers celebrating Inter Faith Week chose to run fairs, inviting communities to showcase their faith and beliefs to members of the public and passers-by.

At some of the more formal events, representatives of faith communities shared what their faith means to them, and speakers were invited to raise awareness of particular traditions or beliefs.

Lord Bourne of Aberystwyth, Minister for Faith, chose the Week to launch a tour of 42 places of worship.
